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
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## Message from the President

The Hong Kong SAR has gone through a series of major challenges in the six years when I stepped down from the President Office of the College. They have left their sequalae which still have impact on the SAR up to these days. For the healthcare field, we witnessed the emigration of many experienced healthcare professionals leading to significant thinning of the workforce, especially in the public sector. The government responded to the challenge by trying hard to recruit physicians and nurses from the mainland and abroad. Legislative amendments were made to accommodate this effort. To what extent this will resolve the manpower predicament in the public sector remains to be seen, and of course we would like to see those vacancies refilled in the earliest possible instance. Indeed, prolonged manpower shortage can by itself become a self-perpetuating factor leading to a downward-going spiral.

Another major event was of course the COVID-19 pandemic. Two consequences can be observed: the rapid emergence of the importance of Chinese Medicine in our healthcare system, and the constant vigilance of the public healthcare sector in preparing for similar outbreaks in the future. We will have the first Chinese Medicine Hospital in Hong Kong operating in late 2025 or early 2026. Hopefully we can leverage on this facility to develop new models of patient care integrating Chinese Medicine with mainstreaming Western Medicine. At the same time the government has



included Chinese Medicine outpatient consultation under its subsidized healthcare schemes, providing another choice for the citizens. From the Western Medicine practitioners' perspective, especially the private primary care physicians, the enhanced entrustment of Chinese Medicine by the Hong Kong people can be a competitive threat. Of course, a more open and positive view is to regard Chinese Medicine as complementary to the mainstream Western Medicine, with the potential to further protect our health. Meanwhile, the constant need for maintaining vigilance against new emergence of infection outbreak of epidemic or pandemic level calls for careful facility planning and resources injection under the stewardship of our expert panel in infectious diseases. My humble wish is that such effort will not significantly divert the focus of our decision makers or undermine the day-to-day care provided to patients in the public hospitals.

The recent promulgation of the Primary Healthcare Blueprint and the series of actions rolled out by the government have also attracted much attention from the media and the citizens. There remain some uncertainties, especially the role of the District Health Centres (DHCs) and the enthusiasm of the private primary care physicians to the call for enrollment in the CDCC program by the government. We would also like to learn more about the list and timeline regarding chronic diseases or health conditions other than Diabetes mellitus and hypertension which the government plans to include under CDCC with resources injection. Despite these uncertainties, these initiatives by the government are commendable, and we hope the private sector and the public at large will respond to them in a positive way.

Finally, there has been strong advocacy from the government and various professional bodies for more intimate exchange and integration of the healthcare systems among the Greater Bay Area cities. With the reform and impressive progresses achieved by the health authorities of the mainland, it is our prerogative to learn more about the latest developments to better prepare ourselves for the coming opportunities or threats.

As a professional body embracing members from multiple healthcare disciplines, the College has the capability and obligation to help promoting deliberations in the local healthcare sector and the public at large in these major healthcare topics by organizing relevant seminars and conferences, and to make our presence by voicing out collective views to the government and other stakeholders in a timely manner. Indeed, I foresee a rather busy to-do list for the College in the coming future, and I would like to call upon all members to work together for the fulfillment of our missions.

## Rethink Ageing: Long Term Care at Home June 25, 2023



Mr Dan Levitt BA, MSc, is a Gerontologist at Simon Fraser university, Canadian Certified Health Executive (CHE) and the CEO of KinVillage at Canada. He has wide speaking profolio at various international seminars as well as social media to promote on how to transform the lives of older adults across different communities and continuously improving the quality of life. He serves as a surveyor for Accreditation Canada, Board member of International Federation of Ageing and a past Board member of the Global Ageing Network.

Organised by our College, together with Hong Kong Geriatrics Society, Hong Kong College of Gerontology Nursing as supporting units, the evening seminar was well received with over 50 members of various health care professionals. Mr Levitt started his presentation with various photos of human faces and asked the attendees a thought-provoking question about how we define old age. He then led us to look at the current policies and strategies on the global trend of aging and its health care related issues. He elaborated that long term nursing bed has become a scarce commodity with public policy re-focused on aging in community. What community-based services are needed to support the older people who come from the post war baby bloomers so as to delay or prevent their admissions into long term nursing homes? Has the rising tide of aging demographic in many metropolitan cities reaches beyond a point of maintaining the nursing home bed stock meeting the society's demand? The long waiting list of the Hong Kong scenario speaks for herself that if no proactive strategy and the political will on action, it will be swallowed by such a big wave with disastrous outcome. Also, what is the role of the community care and healthy living can meet the changing expectation of how this new cohort might experience aging?



With these and many other questions, the seminar on how we rethink ageing was turned into hot discussion to share various lesson learnt from the recent COVID pandemic. The cross road on the new reality of examining quality of life for the vulnerable vs the sustainability of managing an inverted population pyramid for the coming decades was acknowledged. These exchanges continued vividly into the dinner session where everyone sharing their own creative idea on healthy aging at home and in the community. Mr Levitt has briefly introduced KinVillage as a

non-profit service provider aiming at enriching the lives of Canadian older group through a unique combination of housing, wellness program and health maintenance services with subsidy from government agencies to fulfil their joint belief of affordable good living to all older citizens. The paradigm shift from hospital-based care to enhancing aging in place has begun.

## Co-administration of COVID-19 Vaccine and Seasonal Influenza Vaccine is Strongly Recommended.

WHO is currently tracking several SARS-CoV-2 variants globally, including XBB.1.5, XBB.1.16 and EG.5; EG.5 remains the most prevalent one and has been reported by 87 countries and continues to rise.

The last risk evaluation for EG.5 as WHO published on 21 September 2023, with an overall evaluation of low additional public health risk at the global level based on available evidence. This aligns with the risk associated with the other currently circulating VOIs. XBB.1.5 and XBB.1.16 have been decreasing in prevalence globally.

The Centre for Health Protection (CHP) also conducts surveillance on SARS-CoV-2 variants from sewage samples. The latest surveillance data (as of Nov 8, 2023) showed that XBB and its descendant lineages

continue to be the most prevalent variant, comprising around 99% of all characterised specimens. CHP also conducted genetic characterisation of 107 specimens obtained from reported severe and fatal cases of COVID-19 between Sep 26 and Oct 24, 2023. The result showed that XBB and its descendant lineages continue to be the most prevalent variant, comprising over 99% of all characterised specimens.

The Scientific Committee on Vaccine Preventable Diseases (SCVPD) and the Scientific Committee on Emerging and Zoonotic Diseases (SCEZD) under the Centre for Health Protection of the Department of Health (JSC) discussed and updated the interim recommendations related to the use of COVID-19 vaccines in Hong Kong on 11 October 2023 for those

at risk, and hence urged individuals in high-risk priority groups to receive a dose of COVID-19 vaccine at least six months since the last dose or infection as early as possible in view of the potential winter surge, regardless of the number of doses received previously. In view of the coming winter influenza season, co-administration of COVID-19 vaccine and seasonal influenza vaccine is strongly recommended. It takes 2 weeks for full protection effect after vaccination taken.

On the adoption of the new monovalent XBB.1.5 mRNA vaccine which developed to target the Omicron variant XBB.1.5 is being considered when available; as a preferred vaccine choice in appropriate age group according to manufacturer's recommendation.
